- II. Call to Order (10:02 am) Director, Lenora Lockett
  - a. Review & Approval of Minutes
    - Motion to approve by Sabrina Roberts, seconded by Kimberly Coleman, minutes approved.
- III. Public Comment
  - There was no public comment.
- IV. Opening Remarks from Equity Commission Members
  - i. Director Lockett reserved remarks for later agenda items.
  - ii. Kimberly Coleman stated that the Human Resources DEI Steering Committee continues to champion DEI initiatives. Communications go out via monthly newsletters, and via direct communications with shareholders. The Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) is now live and will start in the Fall 2022 semester. This program is available to all employees that have at least one (1) year continuing services. Assistance covers both Undergraduate and Graduate courses with a cap

- of \$3,600.00 per year. Courses may be taken at Cleveland State University, Baldwin Wallace as well as Tri-C. There will be a series of lunch and learns with Tri-C, as well as an Open House on July 27, 2022, at the Westshore Professional Center for individuals who would like to learn more.
- iii. Sabrina Roberts spoke on how the Department of Health and Human Services, is also championing DEI initiatives, especially the GARE Survey as well as the county wide DEI Training. She took this time to thank all HHS Department Directors and staff for all of their work in championing these programs.
- iv. Deputy Director Vaughn Johnson stated that the Department of Development continues to work in advancing internal equity work, as well as championing county wide initiatives. Deputy Director Johnson spoke on two (2) specific projects pertaining to the use of ARPA funds.
  - Brownfields-\$5m- low-moderate income areas would be reactivated once work has been completed. Companies who utilize MBE contractors would receive bonus points regarding scoring program.
  - 2. Small Business Grants-\$2m-Grants provided directly to small businesses that are established to assist in scaling/growing their business up to \$50,000 in assistance for other locations, increasing employment opportunities.

# 1) Growth Opportunity Partners - GreenBank - \$1m

At Growth Opportunity Partners ("Growth Opps"), we offer community development capital, services and solutions to growing small businesses, primarily located in underserved, low and moderate income (LMI) communities in Ohio.

# WHAT IS THE GO GREEN ENERGY FUND?

Growth Opps in collaboration with Coalition for Green Capital (CGC) has established a Green Bank model that can deploy mission-driven capital to support small-scale commercial and industrial solar project development in Ohio. With support from The George Gund Foundation, The Cleveland Foundation, and the Cuyahoga County Government, CGC completed a market opportunity analysis in 2019 to determine the potential for a Green Bank model to increase clean energy development in Cuyahoga County, Ohio. Based upon this analysis, CGC found that there exists today a market in Cuyahoga County, to deploy a minimum of \$15 million of mission-driven capital to support \$30 million or more of projects in the county's solar market over the next five years. The GO Green Energy Fund was born.

### WHAT IS A GREEN BANK?

A Green Bank is a financial institution, typically public or quasi-public, that uses innovative financing techniques and market development tools in partnership with the private sector to accelerate deployment of clean energy technologies. What makes the GO Green Energy Fund unique? The GO Green Energy Fund was created and lives within Growth Opportunity Partners (Growth Opps), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit. It leverages private investment in clean energy technologies to reduce energy costs, stimulate economic activity, create Meaningful Wage Jobs, and expedites the transition to a low-carbon economy.

## Section 1 - Description of the Project Team

The Rid-All Foundation, d.b.a. The Rid-All Green Partnership, is a 501(c)(3) urban agriculture and environmental stewardship organization that has operated in the City of Cleveland's Lower Kinsman neighborhood for over a decade. The organization was started by three co-founders: Damien Forshe, Randell McShepard and Keymah Durden, who all grew up together in the Lee-Miles community in Cleveland's Ward 1. The group decided in 2010 to begin an effort to clean up a notorious illegal dumping site known as the "Forgotten Triangle" and to convert it to a thriving urban farm that could bring hope and opportunity back to an otherwise distressed neighborhood. The effort began with the lease of 1.3 acres of vacant land that was transformed to a viable urban farm space over a two-year period. That slow but steady transformation continued year after year, resulting in a nationally-renown urban farm today-some 10 years later.

The Rid-All campus currently includes two green houses and six hoop houses where urban agriculture activities (growing) take place. The campus also includes an EPA licensed compost facility, an aquaponics business that has farm-raised over 60,000 tilapia fish, and a recently constructed community kitchen/restaurant building where cooking classes, chef demonstrations and healthy eating workshops are offered on a regular basis. The Rid-All campus has grown from 1.3 acres to 18 acres, and hundreds of youth and adults have participated in formal training programs and special events, as well as in a volunteer capacity.

Rid-All was established with equity as the bedrock of its business model. The major impetus that led to the formation of the urban farm was the health disparities that were identified in the Lower Kinsman neighborhood for African Americans as compared to their white counterparts. Incidences of cancer, diabetes, heart disease and obesity, all of which can be controlled to a great extent by diet, were far more prevalent in African American communities, resulting in significant disparities in life expectancy. The co-founders established the organization with a sense of urgency to address this issue. Today, 100% of the staff and 75% of the Board of Directors are African American, and all share a passion for equity and inclusion in all aspects of our daily operations and in society in general. The organization will continue to build equity by advocating for the health and well-being of minority communities and promoting practices and policies that strengthen and protect the environmental footprint of the urban core to ensure equitable health outcomes and overall improved quality of life.


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

# Men's Shelter Expansion Project



- 2020 Lakeside Avenue facility will add additional 124 beds
- Existing Men's Shelter, 2100 Lakeside Avenue, consists of accommodations for up to 350 individuals
- Men's Shelter through LMM includes counseling, education, medical referrals and jobs training
- Construction Sept. 2022 March 2023
- Estimated construction contract is \$4 M
- Cost of the building \$600,000





# Irishtown Bend



- Stabilization shore bank to keep shipping channel open.
   The result will simultaneously implement a 23-acre park for the community
- Rebuilds Cleveland as a more equitable place where industry, nature and diverse neighborhoods can thrive
- Involves 18-24 months removing unstable soil and building retaining wall, then construction of park on reconfigured slope
- \$2.5M from County ARPA of \$46M
- DBE to be set by ODOT





# **Central Neighborhood Surge Improvements**



- Project includes:
  - Construction of existing park expansion \$1.0 M ARPA
  - Construction of a new road adjacent to the recreation center and park - \$2.0 M (\$1.2 M ARPA)
- Advancing/Addressing Equity thru focusing resources in neighborhoods that have been historically underserved.
- SBE/MBE/WBE goals to be set for construction contract

# Jail Wireless & Security Network Improvements



- Jail security wireless network will streamline currently processes within facility
- Significant data capacity for wireless services improvement through the jail for jail programs and to conduct remote visitation, remote court hearings, and for inmate housing unit programming. \$500,000 ARPA
- Scheduled for completion in fall 2022.





# Cuyahoga County Lakefront Public Access Plan



- The Plan focuses on:
  - 1. Improved public access to Lake Erie
  - 2. Erosion control and ecological enhancement
  - 3. Enhanced networks along the shoreline.
- The Plan builds on the successful public-private partnership model built in Euclid.
- Advancing/Addressing Equity:
  - 30 miles of coastline, only 22% public accessible
  - Plan will potentially open over 5 miles of new access
- \$8.0 M ARPA
