WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County received \$239,898,257 from the Federal Government through the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA"); and

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County calculated 100% of the ARPA dollars as loss revenue under the U.S. Department of the Treasury Final Rule; and

WHEREAS, since all the ARPA dollars have been calculated as loss revenue, the ARPA dollars have been deposited in the County's General Fund; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive and County Council have authorized \$86 million of the ARPA dollars for community grants to benefit the residents of Cuyahoga County (the "ARPA Community Grant Fund"); and

WHEREAS, of the \$86 million for community grants, \$66 million have been encumbered for equal distribution to each County Council District; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding from the District 11 ARPA Community Grant Fund in the amount of \$50,000 to the City of South Euclid for Year Three of the South Euclid Deer Sterilization Program; and

WHEREAS, the City of South Euclid estimates approximately 21,000 people will be served annually through this award; and

WHEREAS, the City of South Euclid estimates the total cost of the project is \$59,890.63; and

WHEREAS, the City of South Euclid indicates the other funding source(s) for this project includes \$65,000 from the City of South Euclid for USDA Wildlife Management Services; and

WHEREAS, the City of South Euclid is estimating the start date of the project will be January 2023 and the project will be completed by February 2023; and

WHEREAS, the City of South Euclid requested \$50,000 from the District 11 ARPA Community Grant Fund to complete this project; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding in the amount of \$50,000 to the City of South Euclid to ensure this project is completed; and

WHEREAS, this Council by a vote of at least eight (8) members determines that it is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue to provide for the usually, daily operations of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

SECTION 1. That the Cuyahoga County Council hereby awards a not-toexceed amount of \$50,000 to the City of South Euclid from the General Fund made available by the American Rescue Plan Act revenue replacement provision for Year Three of the South Euclid Deer Sterilization Program.

SECTION 2. If any specific appropriation is necessary to effectuate this agreement, the Director of the Office of Budget and Management is authorized to submit the requisite documentation to financial reporting to journalize the appropriation.

SECTION 3. That the County Council staff is authorized to prepare all documents to effectuate said award.

SECTION 4. That the County Executive is authorized to execute all necessary agreements and documents consistent with said award and this Resolution.

SECTION 5. If requested or necessary, the Agency of the Inspector General or Department of Internal Audit is authorized to investigate, audit, or review any part of this award.

SECTION 6. To the extent that any exemptions are necessary under the County Code and contracting procedures, they shall be deemed approved by the adoption of this Resolution.

SECTION 7. It is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the County; the preservation of public peace, health or safety in the County; and any additional reasons set forth in the preamble. Provided that this Resolution receives the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the

earliest occurrence of any of the following: (1) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (2) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Cuyahoga County Charter, or (3) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Cuyahoga County Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

SECTION 8. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of the Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

South Euclid Deer Sterilization Pilot Program – Year Three

South Euclid is the site of an innovative pilot program to study non-lethal deer population control. The City of South Euclid is seeking funding to participate in year-three of this unique three-to-five-year study to determine the feasibility of managing the white-tailed deer population through fertility control.

Under a research permit issued by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, veterinarians and capture professionals managed by eco-system and wildlife population research consultant, White Buffalo Inc. will be anesthetizing, sterilizing and tagging female deer in January-February 2024. A team of volunteers will also participate in the program.

The purpose of the pilot project is to determine whether it is possible to manage overabundant deer herds through nonlethal means alone. The research being done in South Euclid will help to provide definitive answers. Based on findings from the Clifton deer research project in Cincinnati, Ohio, it is estimated the operation will significantly restrict herd growth through the reduction of the fawning rate, the deer population should stabilize and then gradually decline over time through natural attrition, with the rate of attrition depending in part on deer migration patterns.

Fertility control technology has been shown to be effective for use on white-tailed deer and several other mammalian species. The public has expressed considerable interest in this approach to managing deer, and it has promise for use on localized deer populations (Rutberg et al., 2013).

The goal for this management approach is short- and/or long-term population management to minimize human-deer interactions or disease outbreaks in areas with high deer populations where hunting is limited, controlled, or prohibited, and where other management tools are difficult or impossible to implement. The City of South Euclid, utilizing the expertise of the USDA and ODNR, has taken a comprehensive approach to wildlife management, incorporating targeted culling, along with non-lethal population control.

The process for sterilization includes the use of wildlife professionals who locate and dart deer from vehicles on public roadways and at bait stations on volunteer properties within the Study Area. The deer are tracked until they are unconscious (typically just a few minutes), and then transported to a surgical site where a veterinarian performs ovariectomies and administers long-acting antibiotics and pain relievers.

All sterilized deer are fitted with state mandated numbered ear tags. Treated deer are then returned to a safe location close to the area where they were found and monitored until recovered. The entire process, from initial darting to release, takes approximately 90 to 120 minutes per deer.

The pilot project study not only impacts South Euclid (est. population 21,000) but also the entire region. During Pilot Year One & Two, it was determined that several tagged deer migrated much further than anticipated, being spotted near the Pennsylvania border, Gates Mills, Waite Hill and other areas in Northeast Ohio.

Studies have indicated that the overpopulation of deer leads to the loss of brush and shrubs as a result of overgrazing. The loss of undergrowth restricts places for small animals and birds to shelter and nest, resulting in the potential loss of many native species that no longer have access to the habitat they need. Deer are also carriers of ticks that can transmit Lyme disease to humans and pets, while their transmission is rare, the more deer that live in a given place, the more hosts exist for the deer ticks and the greater the chances are that a human will be bitten and contract the disease.

If applicable, how does this project serve as a catalyst for future initiatives:

This pilot project will work to determine whether deer sterilization, either alone or with other forms of deer population control, is an effective way to control the overpopulation of deer, and will serve as a model for other communities as we look towards a more regional approach to deer and wildlife management in Cuyahoga County.

Introduction, Expanded Study Area, and Maintenance

The City of South Euclid is in northeast Ohio and contains approximately 4.7 miles². The City contracted with USDA-Wildlife Services to implement a sharpshooting program that lethally removed 66 deer in 2020/21, 101 deer in 2021/22, and 118 deer in 2022/23. Sterilization efforts were initially focused in the area south of Rt. 322 (see Appendix A), where smaller green spaces significantly limit sharpshooting activities (e.g., only 19 of the 101 deer culled were harvested south of Route 322 in 2021), and because of the suitability for the sterilization approach. In the second year of sterilizations (Year 2, winter 2023/23), efforts were expanded into a similarly developed area north of Route 322, bounded to the east by South Green Road and to the north by Bluestone Road. This expanded area added ~0.75 mile² to the original 1.9 mile² combined sharpshooting/sterilization zone. There remains an abundance of deer in the periphery of the sterilization zone as recorded during the camera survey and reported in the Final Year 2 Report (submitted 3 May 2023). It is evident that housing densities are too high to effectively manage deer using sharpshooting methods alone. Additional, annual sterilization efforts are required to maintain the progress made in Years 1 and 2, and to address peripheral deer with home ranges overlapping the study area that were not treated in Year 2.

Objectives

The objectives remain the same, with any remaining untagged females being sterilized in the original and expanded sterilization area. As part of the original study design and objectives, the lethal removal of deer (both select tagged and untagged) will continue in all areas of South Euclid. This research does not preclude tagged deer from being culled outside of the city limits.


Principal Investigators





PROJECT DESCRIPTION

REQUEST DESCRIPTION (include the project name, a description of the project, why the project is important or needed, and timeline of milestones/tracking of the project):

Ohio's landscape for Black and Brown children is one that has historically provided inequitable access to programming and resources which continue to disproportionately impact Black and Brown children. The lack of investment in some communities have resulted in numerous disparities that impact children in their earliest years, prenatal-3 throughout school-age which has been found to directly impact a child's overall health. Cuyahoga County has a 51-94% population of African Americans disproportionately impacting Black Children who experience poverty 3x more likely than white children. Ohio's children rank as 2nd highest lead poisoning rate that disproportionately affects African American children coupled with the recent NIEER study, reporting Ohio only serves 2.6% of children eligible for early intervention and early childhood special education with children of color less likely to receive services than white children. "Racial disparities in services – particularly lower rates of participation for Black children – should be ringing alarm bells across the nation," said Dr. Steven Barnett, Rutgers professor of education and co-director of the NIEER.

Ohio's existing early childhood system is fragile and compromised due to a culmination of various deficits that include: early childhood workforce shortages, extensive waiting list of supports, high rates of lead exposure that can cause neurological damage and developmental delays in children, low birth outcomes, and an extensive proposed legislative budget cuts that can ultimately sever existing supports. BCDI Ohio recognizes the profound adverse impact of these deficits which have always existed but have become more illuminated in how elevated these disparities were during the COVID pandemic and post pandemic (current) that warrants the need for solutions.

- For every twenty children living in Ohio, nine are economically disadvantaged, including five living in poverty.
- In 2017 alone, 18 children, ages one to 17, lost their lives to homicides in Cuyahoga County.[4] Each of these children had families, friends networks of people impacted by the tragedy of an unexpected loss. As 90 percent of the brain's development occurs by the age of five,[5] trauma such as this has been shown to have a significant effect on a child's behavior. These children don't have disabilities, but they may need other kinds of support at school.

As we battle the stigmas of poverty and racism to develop and implement evidence-based programs to amplify the voice of those vulnerable populations we look at the alarming statistics as the ones above and mobilize our local and national collaborators to provide resources for the black and brown early childhood child and their family in Ohio. The scope of work by BCDI Ohio has been a collaboration of local and national members addressing the crisis of black and brown children and their families in Ohio. Encompassing the mission of the national organization in our work throughout Ohio we have partnered in developing and delivering strengths-based, culturally relevant, evidence-based, and trauma-informed resources that respond to the unique strengths and needs of Black children around issues including early childhood education, health and wellness, literacy, and family engagement.

In identifying strategies for achieving positive outcomes for the Black children whose early development is too often impacted by adverse childhood experiences which operate in tandem with economic poverty and racial discrimination. As a support to Black families who are determined to raise healthy Black children notwithstanding these realities, with two researchers BCDI Ohio has developed and implements a strength-based, culturally relevant, evidenced-based and trauma informed curriculum which privileges the unique strengths and needs of Black children. The curriculum is delivered to early childhood teachers, administrators, and staff with the goal of offering to the same audience for the K-12 grade levels.

Research has demonstrated that Black children who have an early positive engagement in the educational environment have a stronger chance of not only remaining in school but thriving and developing strong academic skills needed to become productive and contributing citizens and eventually role models for their own children.

Activities that will Address the Problem

To address the social, emotional, and mental health concerns that children and adolescents are facing, the proposed four modules will train professionals on effective prategies to support children and adolescents in various settings.

The proposed topics for the modules include *Introduction to the Training and the Worldview of the Black Child; What is Bias and the Impact on Black Children; The Effect of Trauma on Black Children; and Special Circumstances that Black Children and Adolescents may Face and Closure of the Training.* Each module that will be provided in the interactive sessions. Each of the four sessions will be approximately 3.5 hours per module.

The delivery of services will be administered in a timeframe that is conducive for staffing for each educational setting while allowing a period of time after each module to process, understand how it applies to the educator's current classroom, and process how to implement or digest practices discussed, shared, and delivered during the training module. Upon returning to the next model indicating what was learned, addressing other probing questions that may have arisen after an educator's day to day interaction in the classroom with children and discussions that may have taken place with families. Timeframe for delivery of modules is strongly dependent on each group of attendees but does not expand pass 90 days in an effort to maintain fidelity of the program and ensure thoughtful engagement and feedback. Resources will be shared during sessions for educators to share with parents.

For each module a pre and post evaluation will be delivered and upon completion of the program an evaluation will be administered to gain feedback and input to ensure that the capacity to effectively respond to the unique needs of black and brown children are met.

In an effort to support parents and build their capacity, BCDI Ohio will continue to provide a safe space for fathers to connect, build relationships, and learn about a myriad of community resources/supports through its quarterly Fatherhood Table Talks and its parent cafes.

IMPACT OF PROJECT:

Who will be served:

Targeted population will be educators throughout Cuyahoga located in urban and first ring districts who serve black and brown children in communities for children ages Prenatal- 12th grade settings. Provision of professional development series of trainings that are trauma informed care centered along with provision of parent cafes and table talks for Black Fathers and Parents which will be utilized to create a safe space for parents and gain resources and supports.

How many people will be served annually: 200+ educators 150+ parents

Will low/moderate income people be served; if so how:

Through the delivery of the trauma informed care training platform to educators, all black and brown children will be served, low/medium income families as educators will gain the understanding and tools to respond adequately to the needs of children and families while recognizing each child's environment, understanding the impact of structural racism impacting families at various access points to services, and gaining a grasp of the profoundness of historical racism. Educators will grasp and be able to identify and garner concepts to support the unique capacity of Black communities.

How does the project fit with the community and with other ongoing projects:

BCDI Ohio is the only organization in Ohio exclusively dedicated to Black children and families, who diligently work to achieve positive outcomes for vulnerable children impacted by the dual legacies of poverty and racial discrimination. As an affiliate of the National Black Child Development Institute, we are a powerful and effective voice on issues related to the education, care, and health of Black children and families. The National office and the affiliate networks have built a legacy of more than 50 years, standing at the forefront to address critical issues affecting Black children and families. In February 2020, BCDI Ohio issued and released the State of the Black Child Ohio, which provides policy recommendations that highlight and address the racial disparities in outcomes for Black Children and families. It provided parents, caregivers, advocates, community leaders, and policymakers policy recommendations to improve education, health and family support systems for Black children and families. Within the report card, we also made several policy recommendations to address preschool suspensions, lead exposure, infant mortality, and support/equip educators with the tools to effectively support Black children and families. It is with these recommendations that we collectively work with organizational leaders to mobilize the community, and narrow the opportunity gap and elevate the cultural lens for Black children and families.

Our agenda requires us to continue the work of addressing and eradicating racial disparities, impacting policy change as a collective voice, and utilizing the strengths of Black children and families. As the affiliate in Northeast Ohio we provide further focus during National Black Child Development Week annually which is an annual week of action mobilizing communities across the country for Black Children. Our intent is to create visibility and action towards issues that are apparent for residents. As examples, our Delivering on the Promise campaign is designed to dismantle the preschool to prison pipeline by addressing the rising rates of suspensions and expulsions in early childhood education and advocating for an inclusive environment for Black children. Our training platform provides fundamental trainings to educators to understand a child's environment, provide practical guidance strategies, understand the impact of trauma including self -trauma, and the importance of parent/educator relationships.

If applicable, what environmental issues or benefits will there be:

In effectively addressing trauma, the harsh preschool to prison pipeline declines, as educators begin to recognize a child's environment, assess the root cause of behavior, and respond proactively to a family's trauma. This coupled with educators being cognizant of their own trauma allows educator's to respond differently when they address their own emotional trauma, whether it extends from personal behaviors or trauma which has been absorbed by their students. The social-emotional learning opportunities are critical to students' healing as well as to their learning. Providing supportive and compassionate learning environments that are trauma-informed have shown to provide positive impacts on the emotional well-being of students and helps them succeed in academics and social life.

If applicable, how does this project serve as a catalyst for future initiatives:

This project will serve as a catalyst to the benefits of future initiatives being responsive to increase the needs of behavioral health access, health access, Medicaid expansion, and mental health support. Yet more importantly to understand the significance of linguistic and cultural responsiveness, coupled with approaching delivery of support for families with a strength based approach.

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County received \$239,898,257 from the Federal Government through the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA"); and

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County calculated 100% of the ARPA dollars as loss revenue under the U.S. Department of the Treasury Final Rule; and

WHEREAS, since all the ARPA dollars have been calculated as loss revenue, the ARPA dollars have been deposited in the County's General Fund; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive and County Council have authorized \$86 million of the ARPA dollars for community grants to benefit the residents of Cuyahoga County (the "ARPA Community Grant Fund"); and

WHEREAS, of the \$86 million for community grants, \$66 million have been encumbered for equal distribution to each County Council District; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding from the District 9 ARPA Community Grant Fund in the amount of \$10,000 to the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc. for the Childhood Hunger Initiative Power Pack Program; and

WHEREAS, the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc. estimates approximately 65 students will be served annually through this award; and

WHEREAS, the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc. estimates the total cost of the project is \$18,000; and

WHEREAS, the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc. indicates the other funding source(s) for this project includes \$7,800 from the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc. as well as in-kind support; and

WHEREAS, the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc.is estimating the start date of the project will be August 2022 and the project will be completed by July 2026; and

WHEREAS, the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc. requested \$10,000 from the District 9 ARPA Community Grant Fund to complete this project; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding in the amount of \$10,000 to the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc. to ensure this project is completed; and

WHEREAS, this Council by a vote of at least eight (8) members determines that it is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue to provide for the usually, daily operations of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

SECTION 1. That the Cuyahoga County Council hereby awards a not-toexceed amount of \$10,000 to the Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Inc. from the General Fund made available by the American Rescue Plan Act revenue replacement provision for the Childhood Hunger Initiative Power Pack Program.

SECTION 2. If any specific appropriation is necessary to effectuate this agreement, the Director of the Office of Budget and Management is authorized to submit the requisite documentation to financial reporting to journalize the appropriation.

SECTION 3. That the County Council staff is authorized to prepare all documents to effectuate said award.

SECTION 4. That the County Executive is authorized to execute all necessary agreements and documents consistent with said award and this Resolution.

SECTION 5. If requested or necessary, the Agency of the Inspector General or Department of Internal Audit is authorized to investigate, audit, or review any part of this award.

SECTION 6. To the extent that any exemptions are necessary under the County Code and contracting procedures, they shall be deemed approved by the adoption of this Resolution.

SECTION 7. It is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the County; the preservation of public

peace, health or safety in the County; and any additional reasons set forth in the preamble. Provided that this Resolution receives the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the earliest occurrence of any of the following: (1) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (2) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Cuyahoga County Charter, or (3) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Cuyahoga County Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

NAME: Childhood Hunger Initiative Power Pack (CHIPPTM)

DESCRIPTION: Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Incorporated in partnership with Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated® Lambda Phi Omega Chapter has implemented the Childhood Hunger Initiative Power Pack (CHIPP[™]) program at the Cleveland Municipal School District's Robert H. Jamison School. This 4-year program, which began July 2022 and will end July 2026, is designed to address childhood hunger and food insecurity by providing free healthy, nutritious meals and snacks throughout the school year, over the weekends and extended school breaks to 65 of the school's students. The program is intended to help children whose families find it difficult to have access to enough food for the entire month. Each week a backpack filled with non-perishable food items is distributed to the participants. The backpacks contain food for two breakfasts, two lunches, two snacks, one can of vegetables and one can of fruit (food list is attached). All items are non-refrigerated and require only water to make.

NEED: According to the Center for Community Solutions, 26.1% of children in this council district are living below the poverty level. The teen birth rate is 34.9 which is higher than 25.3 for Cuyahoga County. It is well documented that maternal health (physical and mental health, nutrition and receiving adequate health care) has a significant impact on the health and well-being of children and is especially essential for teen mothers. 10.2% of the residents do not have health insurance. According to publicschoolreview.com, 97% of Robert H. Jamison's students are African American. 95% of the students receive free or reduced lunch. Overall Testing Rank is in the bottom 50%. According to reportcard.education.ohio.gov 23.23% of the district's students have been identified as having a disability. 44.8% of the students were chronically absent. According to Greatschools.Org, 100% of the students are from low-income families. The test scores at this school fall far below the state average which suggests that the students are likely not performing at grade level. Studies confirm school-aged children are aware of and distressed by food insecurity in their household. They often try to help manage food resources in the family, either by supporting the efforts of their parents or by initiating their own strategies for reducing food intake (including choosing to eat less than they want). Adolescents describe food insecurity in terms of quantity (eating less than usual, eating more or faster when food is available), quality (having only a few low-cost foods), affective states (worry, anxiety, or sadness about the family's food, shame or fear of being labeled "poor," feelings of having no choice or of adults trying to shield them from food insecurity). and social dynamics (using social networks to get food or being socially excluded). Children in food-insecure households generally have limited access to high-quality food. Environmental realities in low-income neighborhoods, including decreased presence of full-service grocery stores and increased availability of fast-food restaurants and energy-dense, nutrient-poor food, may create barriers for low-income families trying to adopt healthy behaviors. Adequate food may be available only intermittently, leading to unhealthy eating patterns and increased stress that may make weight management difficult and facilitate the development of obesity. Hunger/food insecurity is one of the non-academic barriers that impede many students' path to academic success. According to nokidhungry.org nearly 60% of children from low-income communities said they had come to school hungry, and the majority of those children said that made school difficult. Of those children, 12% reported being too distracted by their hunger to be able to tackle their evening homework. Teachers also observed the effects of hunger; 80% observed the negative impact of hunger on concentration; 76% saw decreased academic performance; 62% saw behavioral issues increased; 47% noticed children getting sick more often.

TIMELINE & TRACKING: We have partnered with Robert H. Jamison School to annually (through July 2026) support 65 students identified by the staff as students who would benefit from the program. Weekly throughout the academic school year, we will provide 65 power packs filled with healthy, nutritious foods. The program will be evaluated at the end of each academic year through interviews with the students, their families and teachers. We will track participant retention, attendance, academic achievement, wellness (physical and behavioral) and participant satisfaction. We will also work with the school staff to regularly monitor and address any negative perceptions/stigmas associated with students related to their participation in the program.

Who will be served:

65 Cleveland Municipal School District Robert H. Jamison School students who have been identified as low-income and experiencing food insecurity.

How many people will be served annually: 65 students receive weekly food power packs throughout the academic year.

Will low/moderate income people be served; if so how:

Yes, all of the students referred for the program are from low-income families.

How does the project fit with the community and with other ongoing projects:

The Childhood Hunger Initiative Power Pack (CHIPP[™]) program compliments and builds on the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), a federally assisted meal program established in 1946 in public and nonprofit private schools and residential childcare institutions which provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free lunches to children each school day by extending the meals to weekends and extended school breaks. It also complements initiatives of local community organizations to provide nutritious meals to students during school breaks inclusive of summer breaks.

If applicable, how many jobs will be created or retained (specify the number for each) and will the jobs be permanent or temporary:

Not applicable. The program does not include employment opportunities.

If applicable, what environmental issues or benefits will there be: Not applicable. The program does not address any environmental issues or provide environmental benefits.

If applicable, how does this project serve as a catalyst for future initiatives:

Sadly, childhood hunger and food insecurity are anticipated to be an ongoing reality. We hope, with a proven 4-year success, our program, which is being implemented internationally, will serve as a model for other organizations to implement similar programs.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION:

Total Budget of Project:

Currently, the program costs are approximately \$2,000/month (\$18,000/academic year). This amount is solely for the cost of the food. The food is packed in a new backpack weekly. The backpacks are provided at no cost by Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated® who has committed to providing the backpacks at no cost for the duration of the program.

Other Funding Sources of Project (list each source and dollar amount separately): For 2023 Linking Partnership Opportunities Foundation, Incorporated allocated \$7,800 for this program. Due to other program commitments and the rising cost of food, we will not be able to support the program at the same level and have begun to solicit donations from our members to help reduce the monetary costs.

We have 3 sources of in-kind support which we anticipate will continue for the duration of the program:

John F. Kennedy High School provides space for us to store the non-perishable food, the power pack backpacks and space to package the backpacks each week.

John F. Kennedy High School Ladies of Today youth group assists in unloading the food from our cars to the storage space and assists with packing the backpacks.

Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated® provides the power pack backpacks that the food is packaged in. Weekly throughout the academic year students receive a new backpack containing food.

Additionally, a gardening program in partnership with the Cuyahoga County Ohio State University Extension Master Gardener Volunteer Program was implemented in 2023 to support the community in starting and maintaining intergenerational community and individual gardens inclusive of growing and harvesting fruits and vegetables and sharing creative ideas for the use of the harvest. Participants were provided with seeds and received weekly instruction and support. The gardening program encourages healthy food choices and affordable food alternatives.

Total amount requested of County Council American Resource Act Dollars: \$10,000

Since these are one-time dollars, how will the Project be sustained moving forward:

While the program began July 2022, due to logistics, we were unable to implement the program until August 2023. It is anticipated that the program will conclude in July 2026. In 2024 we will be ending year 2 and entering year 3 of this 4-year program. We are anticipating an increase in food cost for this program. We have asked Foundation members to begin donating monetary and non-perishable items to help reduce the cost of the program.

- 1. We have two signature fundraising events, one in the summer and one in the fall. The proceeds of those two events are earmarked for scholarships and community programs. As we have multiple community programs, only a portion of the proceeds of those events can be used to help fund this program. We will explore additional fundraising activities specifically to assist in funding this program.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

This corporation is a public benefit corporation. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall constitute the carrying on of propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, or any other initiative or referendum before the public, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including by publication or distribution of statements), any political campaign on behalf of, or in opposition to, any candidate for public office;

3. The corporation shall not lend any of its assets to any officer or director of this corporation [unless such loan program is regularly conducted as part of the activities of the organization and the qualification of the individual to participate in same is determined by a panel comprised solely of non-Board members], or guarantee to any person the payment of a loan by an officer or director of the corporation; and







Actual Performance versus performance indicators (include statistics):	During the first year of the contract, 5,169 moms were in the eligible population; 3,182 were eligible for the program and offered a home visit by an RN; 3,141 moms agreed to a visit from an RN, and 1,568 received a visit. While this falls short of the goal, it is because the original goal was based on an expansion of the program that due to legal reasons at the program's hospitals was delayed until late in the year. WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County received \$239,898,257 from the Federal Government through the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA"); and

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County calculated 100% of the ARPA dollars as loss revenue under the U.S. Department of the Treasury Final Rule; and

WHEREAS, since all the ARPA dollars have been calculated as loss revenue, the ARPA dollars have been deposited in the County's General Fund; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive and County Council have authorized \$86 million of the ARPA dollars for community grants to benefit the residents of Cuyahoga County (the "ARPA Community Grant Fund"); and

WHEREAS, of the \$86 million for community grants, \$66 million have been encumbered for equal distribution to each County Council District; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding from the District 11 ARPA Community Grant Fund in the amount of \$10,000 to the PetFix Northeast Ohio, Inc. for the purpose of the Clinic Roof Replacement project; and

WHEREAS, the PetFix Northeast Ohio, Inc. estimates approximately 10,900 animal surgeries will be provided through this award; and

WHEREAS, the PetFix Northeast Ohio, Inc. estimates approximately 19 permanent and temporary jobs will be created or retained through this project; and

WHEREAS, the PetFix Northeast Ohio, Inc. estimates the total cost of the project is \$62,450; and

WHEREAS, the PetFix Northeast Ohio, Inc. indicates the other funding source(s) for this project includes from their own operating revenue; and

WHEREAS, the PetFix Northeast Ohio, Inc.is estimating the project will be completed upon receipt of the funds; and

WHEREAS, the PetFix Northeast Ohio, Inc. requested \$10,000 from the District 11 ARPA Community Grant Fund to complete this project; and

SECTION 3. That the County Council staff is authorized to prepare all documents to effectuate said award.

SECTION 4. That the County Executive is authorized to execute all necessary agreements and documents consistent with said award and this Resolution.

SECTION 5. If requested or necessary, the Agency of the Inspector General or Department of Internal Audit is authorized to investigate, audit, or review any part of this award.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

REQUEST DESCRIPTION (include the project name, a description of the project, why the project is important or needed, and timeline of milestones/tracking of the project):

PetFix Northeast Ohio – Clinic Roof Replacement

The building at 885 E. 222nd St. in Euclid was originally built in 1966. PetFix purchased the building in 2012 and made interior renovations to create a functional, high-volume spay and neuter clinic. We knew at the time that the roof would need to be replaced at some point in the future. Over the next 11 years we experienced leaking from the roof and have had minor repairs performed to keep the water at bay. We know that now we must invest in a longer-term solution. Recent core samples revealed that there are presently two layers of roofing and insulation (4.25" thick). Unfortunately, we would need to remove the build-up of roofing and insulation, to follow code and make sure there is no trapped moisture under the roof system. (Manufacturers only allow for a maximum of 2 roof systems.) We have been in consultation with West Side Roofing, a family owned and operated company in Cuyahoga County since 1931. Their scope of work would include the following:

- The existing layers of roofing and insulation will be removed down to the concrete roof deck.
- Obsolete vent stacks, if found, will be eliminated, and covered with metal.
- A 2.5" rigid ISO board insulation will be applied over the concrete decking in a foam adhesive.
- A single ply .060 EPDM rubber membrane roofing will be installed in a totally adhered application.
- The EPDM membrane will be extended up the perimeter wall lines.
- A new commercial flange-back gutter will be installed and tied into the new roof system.
- Preformed sheet metal flashing will be installed on the outside perimeter edges of the building.

We would anticipate the work being completed before the end of 2024.

IMPACT OF PROJECT:

Who will be served:

PetFix Northeast Ohio is a non-profit organization that provides high quality, affordable spay and neuter surgeries to end pet homelessness and the need for unnecessary euthanasia. PetFix has performed more than 120,000 surgeries since the clinic launched its services in 2006 for pet owners, rescues and shelters offering animals for adoption, and those caring for free-roaming cats.

How many people will be served annually:

The PetFix medical staff performed 10,418 surgeries in 2021, 10,298 surgeries in 2022 and 10,900 surgeries in 2023 to help pet owners care for their cats and dogs.

Will low/moderate income people be served; if so how:

PetFix was founded – and continues to exist – to serve low/moderate income people. The affordable PetFix fees are designed to make it possible for everyone to be a responsible pet owner. PetFix's prices for spay/neuter surgery range from \$25-\$105 and have remained the same for more than 5 years despite increasing costs. We also raise additional grant funds to subsidize fees for owners who receive government assistance (making it even more affordable for them).

How does the project fit with the community and with other ongoing projects:

The need is great. Cleveland and the area around our clinic, specifically the neighborhoods on the east side of Cleveland, East Cleveland, and Euclid, include many pet owners who have limited resources and limited access to affordable veterinary services. PetFix works closely with animal welfare organizations in the area to help pet owners access services. Some of these organizations include pet food pantries and pet resource centers serving low-income families.

If applicable, how many jobs will be created or retained (specify the number for each) and will the jobs be permanent or temporary:

By keeping our clinic facility in safe and stable condition with a new roof, this project will help retain 19 employees (full-time and part-time). PetFix has two surgeons, along with veterinary technicians, medical support staff and administrative staff. We don't anticipate any new jobs will be created by the project.

If applicable, what environmental issues or benefits will there be:

A well-insulated roof will enable to PetFix to maintain a comfortable temperature year-round while using less energy to heat and cool the building.

If applicable, how does this project serve as a catalyst for future initiatives:

PetFix continues to experience extraordinary demand for our services. Today, we are telling pet owners that they must wait up to four months for an appointment. Securing the viability of this building is foundational as we continue to develop expansion plans. Our goal is to grow from ~10,000 surgeries per year to ~12,000 in the coming years. Having a facility that we can count on can only help us achieve that goal.

We do not anticipate a need for roof repairs or replacement for many years. The new roof comes with a 20year manufacturer's warranty and a 5-year warranty applies to leaks due to workmanship.
