WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County received \$239,898,257 from the Federal Government through the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA"); and

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County calculated 100% of the ARPA dollars as loss revenue under the U.S. Department of the Treasury Final Rule; and

WHEREAS, since all the ARPA dollars have been calculated as loss revenue, the ARPA dollars have been deposited in the County's General Fund; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive and County Council have authorized \$86 million of the ARPA dollars for community grants to benefit the residents of Cuyahoga County (the "ARPA Community Grant Fund"); and

WHEREAS, of the \$86 million for community grants, \$66 million have been encumbered for equal distribution to each County Council District; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding from the District 9 ARPA Community Grant Fund in the amount of \$10,000 to the Urban League of Greater Cleveland for the 2025 National Urban League Conference; and

WHEREAS, the Urban League of Greater Cleveland estimates approximately 92 affiliate organizations will be served through this award; and

WHEREAS, the Urban League of Greater Cleveland estimates the total cost of the project is \$20,000; and

WHEREAS, the Urban League of Greater Cleveland indicates the other funding source(s) for this project includes \$10,000 from the 2024 ULGC Equal Opportunity Day Luncheon fundraiser; and:

- **WHEREAS**, the Urban League of Greater Cleveland is estimating the start date of the project will be July 14, 2025, and the project will be completed by July 20, 2025; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Urban League of Greater Cleveland requested \$10,000 from the District 9 ARPA Community Grant Fund to complete this project; and
- WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding in the amount of \$10,000 to the Urban League of Greater Cleveland to ensure this project is completed; and
- WHEREAS, this Council by a vote of at least eight (8) members determines that it is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue to provide for the usually, daily operations of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

- **SECTION 1.** That the Cuyahoga County Council hereby awards a not-to-exceed amount of \$10,000 to the Urban League of Greater Cleveland from the General Fund made available by the American Rescue Plan Act revenue replacement provision for the 2025 National Urban League Conference.
- **SECTION 2.** If any specific appropriation is necessary to effectuate this agreement, the Director of the Office of Budget and Management is authorized to submit the requisite documentation to financial reporting to journalize the appropriation.
- **SECTION 3.** That the County Council staff is authorized to prepare all documents to effectuate said award.
- **SECTION 4.** That the County Executive is authorized to execute all necessary agreements and documents consistent with said award and this Resolution.
- **SECTION 5.** If requested or necessary, the Agency of the Inspector General or Department of Internal Audit is authorized to investigate, audit, or review any part of this award.
- **SECTION 6.** To the extent that any exemptions are necessary under the County Code and contracting procedures, they shall be deemed approved by the adoption of this Resolution.
- **SECTION 7.** It is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the County; the preservation of public peace, health or safety in the County; and any additional reasons set forth in the preamble. Provided that this Resolution receives the affirmative vote of at least

eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the earliest occurrence of any of the following: (1) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (2) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Cuyahoga County Charter, or (3) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Cuyahoga County Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

SECTION 8. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of the Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Project Name: Brilliant Misfits Youth Enrichment Program – Bratenahl

Project Description:

Brilliant Misfits is currently operating a youth enrichment program out of the Village of Bratenahl and the Bratenahl Community Center. This program offers a combination of structured youth football activities and creative arts workshops, including filmmaking, digital storytelling, and marketing skills. Our mission is to provide under-resourced youth from Cuyahoga County with a safe, inspiring space to grow both on and off the field, developing discipline, creativity, confidence, and real-world skills.

Why the Project Is Important:

Many youth in the Greater Cleveland area, particularly those from under-resourced neighborhoods, lack access to consistent mentorship, safe recreational spaces, and creative development programs. I know firsthand how important this work is. Growing up in the inner city of Cleveland, off E. 76th Street and St. Clair Ave., I didn't have many safe spaces or mentors. Gun violence, drugs, and poverty were all around me. Basketball became my escape, my way out of a reality that felt like it was holding me captive.
