



What does Cuyahoga County do for me?

Builds & Maintains Infrastructure: The County builds and maintains physical infrastructure like roads and bridges. Counties also provide public transit options and support essential community infrastructure, including airports, parks, and water and sewer systems.

Supports Job Creation: Cuyahoga County runs economic development programs to draw investment, attract new businesses, and promote job growth. This includes revitalization programs, tax incentives, and workforce skill-building.

Manages Money: The County balances residents' needs for services with finite taxpayer funds. Counties can raise or reduce public funds by adjusting taxes and fees, and by placing referendums before voters.

Helps Those in Need: The County administers programs that protect children and older adults, provide child support, and connect families to food, transportation, employment opportunities and more.

Administers Justice: The County's Sheriff's Office keeps the peace and runs the County Jail, while the Prosecutor's Office prosecutes criminal acts. The Court of Common Pleas helps people resolve wideranging disputes.

And More! In addition to these vital functions, the County also implements programs to protect our environment, air, and water, enforce building code and land use restrictions, administer elections, and so much more!

Are You VOTE READY? ____

The November 5, 2024 Presidential General Election is fast-approaching, and it will decide the next President and Vice President of the United States, U.S. Senate, Congress, Ohio Senate, Ohio House, and County Council, as well as state, county, and local issues. You can vote by mail, early in person, or on Election Day.

I cannot stress enough that your voice and your vote are SO powerful. Voting is one of the only ways that you can have a real effect on change both in your community and across the country. Voting is safe and confidential!

Important dates:

October 7: Last day to register to vote

October 8: First day of early in-person voting and vote-by-mail voting

October 29: Last day to send in vote-by-mail/absentee ballot applications

November 3: Last day to vote in-person at the Board of Elections

November 4: Last day to send in vote-by-mail/absentee ballots

November 5: Election Day (6:30 a.m.-7:30 p.m.)


Living in Place Senior Resource Fair_

Roughly 16% of District 7's population is over the age of 65—that's roughly a 5th of the population! Yet our older adults are often not set up with the resources to continue living in their communities and their homes for as long as they can.

That's why I'm inviting you to join me as I host "Living in Place: A life worth living" senior resource fair on Thursday, October 17 from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. At this event, you can receive a biometric screening, plan your estate, get connected with senior resources and programs, apply for food assistance, and much more. I look forward to seeing you there!







Nailed It! ____

In keeping with the concept of "living in place," many older residents can't physically perform home repairs or afford repairs or installation of disability accommodations. The Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging (WRAAA) NailsIt program addresses this issue by providing basic repairs and modifications so that homeowners can stay in their residences for as long as possible. These repairs include the installation of grab bars, toilet rails and ADA toilets, disability accommodating showers, and stair safety rails—this can go a long way in ensuring the safety of our county's most vulnerable population.

I was proud to work with WRAAA on the development of this initiative and provide \$1.4 million in ARPA Community Grant

funding as we work together to keep residents in their homes. If you or someone you know may be interested in these home repairs, see if you're eligible and apply by calling 216-539-2138.







Improvements to West Side Market

Cleveland's West Side Market has been an architectural gem in our city for more than a century, and still stands as one of Cleveland's greatest assets and one of Ohio's iconic landmarks. You may have heard that changes are coming to the market—it needs extensive restoration and investment to bring it into the 21st century to achieve its full potential as a community resource.

To help the Market overcome challenges and thrive for another 100 years, Mayor Justin Bibb urged the formation of the Cleveland Public Market Corporation (CPMC), an independent nonprofit with its own staff to manage and grow the Market. The CPMC worked with the community and Market retailers to develop a Master Plan for the future of the Market, and exciting things are coming!

Improvements to the Market include:

- A new prepared food hall with seating in the North Arcade building
- A landscaped courtyard with seating between the Arcade and the Market Hall
- A new teaching kitchen designed for education programs
- A new commercial kitchen to serve merchants and entrepreneurial ventures
- Event space with seating on the East Mezzanine

While a multitude of government funding sources have been identified, the completion of this transformation will take buy-in from the entire community. To make a donation to the Market or learn more about changes coming, visit westsidemarket.org.

Want to do business with Cuyahoga County? We're hosting a Vendor Fair on Thursday, October 17 from 9 a.m.noon at 2501 Harvard Avenue in Newburgh Heights. Current or potential vendors can meet Procurement staff, share their offerings, expertise, and qualifications, and learn about goods and services purchased by Cuyahoga County. Attendees will receive assistance from County staff with registering in the County supplier

portal, viewing current bids, requests for proposals, quotes for goods and services, and submitting bids. Vendors will also learn how to apply for County certifications, including Small Business Enterprise (SBE), Minority Business Enterprise (MBE), and Women Business Enterprise (WBE). New 311 Online Service _

The City of Cleveland recently unveiled its new 311 online service, which allows residents to submit requests related to public works, sanitation, street maintenance, city parks and more via online forms. The online forms are routed directly to City Hall departments to complete the work. Forms are designed to be simple and accessible, asking residents to tell the city what the issue is, where

it's located, and upload up to 3 pictures. After submitting, residents will receive a confirmation number to track their requests. If residents create a login, they can track the status of their requests through their online account.




