



Q1-2024/ Q2-2024 Accomplishments:

Cuyahoga County received \$239,898,257 from the federal government through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Cuyahoga County calculated 100% of the ARPA dollars as loss revenue under the U.S. Department of Treasury's Final Rule and deposited it into the County's General Fund. The County Executive and County Council have authorized \$86 million of the ARPA dollars for community grants to benefit the residents of Cuyahoga County, known as the ARPA Community Grant Fund. \$66 million was evenly distributed to the 11 Council Districts. Since funds were allocated, District 7 has approved \$6 million in American Rescue Plan Act dollars to benefit District 7 and other Cuyahoga County projects that are beneficial to our Cuyahoga County community. Save the Date: Hitchcock Center Groundbreaking

The Hitchcock Center for Women will be celebrating a groundbreaking on a new building on Friday, June 28th at 11:00 a.m. (1227 Ansel Road, Cleveland). The new 77,000 square-foot facility plans to bolster the Hitchcock

Center's supportive housing and residential treatment options and will allow for expanded care and for children to stay with their mothers, a service unique to the center. I was proud advocate and spearhead this project in the County. In total, County Council and the County provided more than \$3.6 million in ARPA funding across two Executive administrations to support this much-needed expansion. My allocation of \$1 million and Council's overall contribution of \$647,000 is a testament to the importance of this project. In addition to residenital treatment, the Center also provides recovering housing during the early stages of recovery, as well as treatment options for those with



mild to moderate addiction who want to carry on with their daily life and get the care they need on a flexible schedule. To schedule as assessment, call 216-421-0662. Or, if you'd like to celebrate the future of this project, join us at the groundbreaking!

<u>Addressing the Juvenile Justice System</u>

Cuyahoga County is concerned about how the juvenile justice system is affecting our youngest residents—is it working? Is the system solving the problem or exacerbating it? Do changes need to be made?

County Council has created the Juvenile Justice Advisory Subcommittee to review how the juvenile justice system is working, and make recommendations to enhance services and improve outcomes for youth. The five-member committee is tasked with assessing how current court programs are working, whether new programs should be added, and where funding is needed to implement reforms. Their first meeting will be July 1st at 9:00 a.m. and streamed



on the County's YouTube page. They will report their recommendations back to Council by December 31st.

In addition, the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court, in partnership with the Cuyahoga County Office of Reentry, Third Sector Capital Partners, Inc., and Case Western Reserve University, received a \$450,000 grant to design a continuum of care to divert youth from the juvenile justice system into community-based alternatives. The initiative, Care First Cuyahoga, will focus on early intervention and prevention strategies to address the root causes of youth involvement in the justice system.

In combination, these two initiatives can work together to divert kids away from the juvenile justice system. I look forward to seeing the positive effect this work will have on our community.

Sexennial Reappraisal

Under Ohio State law and Department of Taxation rules, real property is reappraised every six years by state licensed appraisers. An appraisal is a professional opinion/estimate of value. Property values are updated based on market estimates, neighborhood sales and new construction, and proposed values per square foot. An

increase in valuation does not mean your property taxes will increase. Property value notices will be sent to property owners in July, and tax bills will become available in December. Residents who wish to contest their valuation can file a complaint with the Board of Revision by visiting cuyahogacounty.gov/bor. Sexennial Reappraisal Presentations are taking place through July. Residents can join the next presentation happening in District 7 on Monday, July 29 from 6-8 p.m. at Saint Agnes Our Lady of Fatima Church (6800 Lexington Ave., Cleveland).

Well Wishes to Olympian


Cleveland's Morelle McCane is on a guest for the gold medal as she represents the USA in Paris, France at the 2024 Summer Olympics!

BEFORE YOU DRIVE TO DCFS

COOLING OFF PERIOD- Spend a few hours apart in a safe location, with relatives, or with friends to calm down and gather

EXPLORE OPTIONS – Seek help from other safe adults for at least 24 hours to help you calm the situation and address immediate concerns.

BE AWARE - Bringing your child to DCFS will initiate an investigation, which could result in a possible neglect complaint and court involvement.

CONTACT - If there is no other option to keep the child and/or family safe, contact the 696-KIDS (5437) HOTLINE or local law enforcement.




