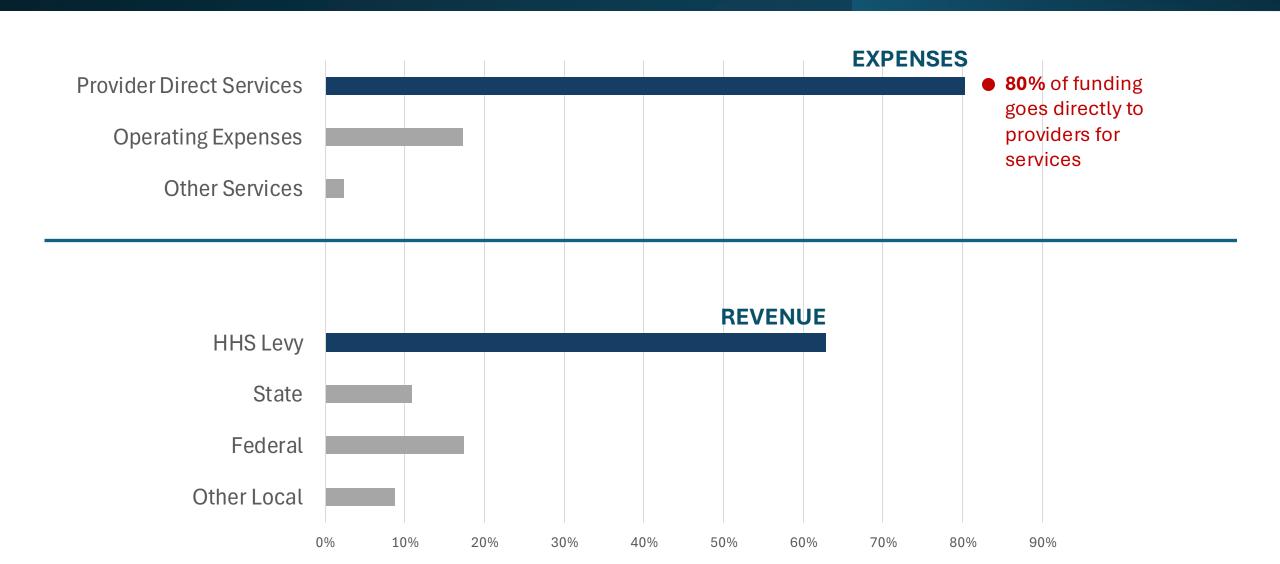
MISSION

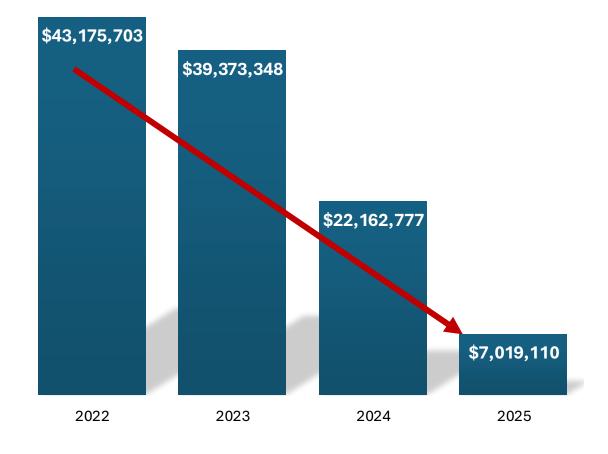

Cash balance will decrease significantly to balance the budget and support crisis expansion

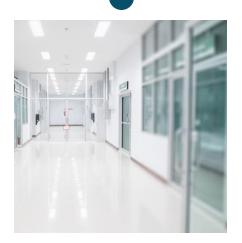


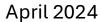

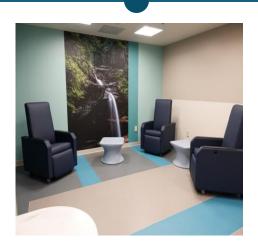

2024/2025 Expanded Crisis Continuum Initiatives

- Opened Step-Up/Step-Down Residential Facility
 - Clients discharged from hospitals requiring stabilization before reentering the community
 - Clients needing stabilization not linked to hospital stay
 - Clients stay up to 90 days
 - Signature Health operating the facility at E.30th and Prospect
 - Utilized one-time ARPA funds from OhioMHAS to establish facility



2024/2025 Expanded Crisis Continuum Initiatives-Psychiatric Emergency Department (PED)

Care Response

- Deploy teams of behavioral health professionals and peers with lived experience through FrontLine Service to respond to mental health crises
- Reserves police involvement for situations where public safety is at risk
- This model prioritizes community care while providing compassionate support to individuals in crisis
- Soft launch in September
- In partnership with the City of Cleveland Department of Public Health, in 44102 and 44105 for the pilot
- Care Committee and marketing campaign launching soon

High quality psychiatric crisis intervention care for vulnerable population

Round-the-clock psychiatric emergency services to meet the need for crisis behavioral healthcare

Located within MetroHealth's Behavioral Health Hospital

2024/2025 Expanded Crisis Continuum Initiatives

Planning for Comprehensive Crisis Center

- Secured \$6.8 M in one time ARPA capital funds from OhioMHAS to establish a Crisis Center
- The Centers will operate facility at 2322 E. 22nd Street (on site of former St. Vincent facility)
- Crisis Center will include:
 - Crisis Intake/Receiving Center (40 "Beds") 24/7 "Living Room" Model will include Urgent Care, Medication Refills, De-escalation, Triage, Assessment, Observation, Treatment, Coordination and Linkage to services
 - Crisis Stabilization Unit (16 Beds) additional crisis stabilization unit for the County offering stabilization services, treatment and coordination of care
