15,000 people each year with DD at all ages.


- Must be eligible for county board services, as outlined in the Ohio Administrative Code:
 - Must have a developmental disability that manifested before age 22
 - Causes substantial functional limitations in areas like selfcare, learning, and mobility, as assessed using a statewide assessment
 - Not solely the cause of mental illness
 - Expected to last a lifetime





What is a Waiver?

- Medicaid Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Waivers are <u>one</u> way a County Board of DD may meet a person's needs.
- Waivers allow individuals to receive needed supports in the community and in their homes instead of an institutional setting.
 - By accepting a waiver, you "waive" your right to institutional care.
 Medicaid waivers are not an entitlement.
- Waiver Eligibility is determined using a standardized needs
 assessment required by the Ohio Administrative Code. Criteria
 include Loss of caregiver, Serious risk of harm due to
 medical/behavioral needs, Discharge from an institutional setting,
 etc.
- Many people have their needs met without a waiver! OAC requires county boards to use other community resources to meet needs before waiver enrollment.




Medicaid Waivers

- Waivers may fund medically necessary items/services such as:
 - Personal care, including hygiene, dressing, household tasks, meal preparation, and community access
 - Transportation
 - Adult day activities or Employment
 - Home modifications or adaptive equipment
- A waiver does NOT cover everything. Does not cover:
 - Anything that can be covered using another payment source (personal resources, health insurance, another organization supporting the person)
 - Housing costs (rent, food, utilities, clothing, etc.)
- Authorized waiver services are based on one's assessed needs and outcomes and, therefore, will vary by person.



Medicaid Waivers


- Approximately 60% of the cost of every Medicaid waiver is federally funded, with a local obligation by the state and county to fund the remaining 40%.
- Waiver enrollment is a lifetime commitment to the person enrolled and can cost a million dollars throughout a person's lifetime.
- County funding for the local matching portion of Medicaid waivers is mandated in rule.


Current Waivers in Cuyahoga County

Waiver Type	# Currently Enrolled	Average Cost per Waiver per Year
Individual Options	2722	\$146,800
Level 1	2372	\$32,500
SELF	48	\$33,000

- Three waivers are similar, with some differences in services and requirements for people on them (self-direction).
- Cuyahoga DD enrolls approximately 105 new waivers every year.



Continued Growth of Waiver Match



• 2025 waiver match expenditure is projected to be \$87,870,000. This is 48% of Cuyahoga DD's budget.



Levy funding

- Cuyahoga DD's primary funding is a 3.9 mill continuous levy passed in 2005.
 - Originally expected to sustain agency operations until 2015
- In Cuyahoga DD's 2025 budget, waiver match is expected to consume 77% of projected levy revenue.
- Additional funding will be needed in the next two to three years.
